**Dr Sue Goldstein:** Dr Sue Goldstein is a medical doctor who specialised in Public Health at the University of the Witwatersrand. She worked in primary health care in Alexandra and Soweto for 10 years prior to specialising. She then became interested in health communication and health promotion and has worked as Community Education Manager at the Johannesburg City Council and at Soul City: Institute for Health and Development Communication since 1995. She has co-authored a book on Health Promotion in South Africa, and taught Health Promotion and research over many years as an honorary lecturer at the University of the Witwatersrand and Pretoria. She has also been an external examiner for the University of the Cape Town. She also has vast experience in communication around AIDS, having worked with both the government “Beyond Awareness” campaigns and the “Khomani” campaigns, as well as in communicating with children, though the development of the Soul Buddyz vehicle, the Soul City vehicle and the Soul Buddyz Club, the OneLove, Phuza Wize and Rise campaigns. As an individual she has always been concerned with social justice and was a founder editor of Critical Health as well as an active member of the NAMDA emergency medical services, an active member of the Progressive Primary Health Care Network and a board member of the PPASA. Dr Goldstein has presented papers at many National and International conferences.



**Mr Pholokgolo Ramothwala:** Pholokgolo Ramothwala is the CEO and founder of Positive Convention, a organization for professionals living with HIV. The organization provides networking opportunities and dialogue platforms for professionals and university students people living with HIV and those affected by it on positive living and leadership related issues. The networking and dialogues take place through the organisation’s magazine called Positive and through different events.

He is a journalist by profession and is openly living with HIV. In the past 20 years of working in the HIV field, he has worked with organizations across the country and southern Africa to advance the rights of people living with HIV. He is currently working with several government departments, corporate employees and university students in his self developed programme LifeBeyondHIV. It is a health and leadership programme aimed at developing new leaders and promoting positive living with HIV.



**Ms Steve Letsike:** Steve is an activist, feminist, leader, mentor, vibrant human rights advocate with global and international high-level advocacy and policy experiences at in gender equality, human rights and accountable governance framework particularly focusing on LGBTI issues and women’s rights, violence against women, HIV and youth leadership for more than 14 years. She is the current South African National AIDS Council (SANAC) Co- Chairperson, a portfolio currently co-chairing with the H.E Cyril Ramaphosa Deputy President of the Republic of South Africa, she is a leader and chairperson of SANAC National Civil Society Forum. She is the Co-Chair of the National Task Team established by the Department of Justice to address Hate Crimes and GBV. Steve serves as a member of the Commonwealth Equality Network, UN Women -Civil Society Advisory Group, Global Fund 4 Women Steering Committee and many other national, regional and international structures. Founding Director of Access Chapter 2 (AC2), a human Rights organization that focuses on LGBTI people, women in their diversity and Civil Society’s participation on public policy development process. She previously has worked with: Anova Health Institute, Open Society Initiative for Southern Africa (OSISA), OUT LGBT Well-Being and for Government- Department of Social Development.

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**DP Cyril Ramaphosa:** Matamela Cyril Ramaphosa was born on 17 November 1952 in Johannesburg. His family was moved from Western Native Township in Soweto in 1962, where he attended Tshilidzi Primary School. He completed high school at Mphaphuli High School in Sibasa, Venda 1971.

He registered to study law at the University of the North in 1972, where he became involved in student politics, joining the South African Student Organisation (SASO) and the Black People's Convention (BPC). He was detained in solitary confinement for 11 months in 1974 under Section 6 of the Terrorism Act for organising pro-Frelimo rallies. He was detained for the second time and held for six months in 1976 following the Soweto student uprising.

While a law clerk for a Johannesburg firm of attorneys, he continued his studies through the University of South Africa (UNISA) obtaining his B. Proc degree in 1981. He then joined the Council of Unions of South Africa (CUSA) as a legal advisor.

In 1982 at the request of the Council of Union of South Africa (CUSA) he founded the National Union of Mineworkers (NUM) with James Motlatsi and Elijah Barayi, and become the union's first General Secretary. He was instrumental in the building NUM into the most powerful union at the time, with membership rising from 6 000 to 300 000 during his tenure. He led mineworkers in one of the biggest strikes in South Africa's history in 1987.

As NUM General Secretary he was instrumental in the establishment in the Congress of South African Trade Unions (COSATU), and played a prominent role in the Mass Democratic Movement (MDM) when COSATU joined forces with the United Democratic Front (UDF) against the apartheid government. He went into hiding in July 1986 after the declaration of a state of emergency. He was later appointed chairperson of the Reception Committee to receive Rivonia trialists and in January 1990, accompanied released ANC political prisoners to Lusaka, Zambia. He served as chairperson of the National Reception Committee, which coordinated arrangements for the release of Nelson Mandela and subsequent welcome rallies within South Africa.

Following the unbanning of the ANC, in 1991 he was elected ANC Secretary General at its first national conference in over 30 years. He became head of the ANC's negotiation team at the Convention for a Democratic South Africa (CODESA) and the subsequent multi-party talks. Following South Africa's first democratic elections on 27 April 1994, he became a Member of Parliament and was elected as Chairperson of the Constitutional Assembly. In that position, he was responsible for overseeing the drafting of South Africa's internationally acclaimed first democratic Constitution. In 2009, this contribution was recognized with the award of the National Order of the Baobab in Silver. On completion of the Constitution drafting process, he left Parliament and his position as ANC Secretary General to move into business, joining New Africa Investments Limited. In 2001, he established Shanduka Group as a black-owned investment holding company, building up a diverse portfolio of listed and unlisted assets.

In 2004, he established the Shanduka Foundation, focusing on education and small business development. The Foundation comprises Adopt-a-School Foundation, Shanduka Black Umbrellas, the Cyril Ramaphosa Education Trust, and the Shanduka internship programme. He is Chairperson of the Advisory Board of the Kagiso Shanduka Trust, a public-private partnership between the Free State De-

partment of Education, Kagiso Trust and Shanduka Foundation.

He has received honorary doctorates from the University of Natal, the University of Port Elizabeth, the University of Cape Town, the University of the North, the University of Lesotho and the University of Massachusetts (USA). He was the first Deputy Chairman of Commonwealth Business Council. He was Vice Chairman of the Global Business Coalition on HIV/AIDS. MS Ramaphosa was appointed along with President Maarti Ahtisaari, as a weapons inspector in Northern Ireland. He also sat on the International Commission of Intervention and State Sovereignty and the UN Secretary General's panel on International Support to NEPAD.

He was appointed Deputy Chairperson of the National Planning Commission in 2010, a body created to draft a long-term national development plan for South Africa. In December 2012, he was elected ANC Deputy President at the ANC's National Conference in Mangaung.

He was appointed Deputy President of the Republic of South Africa on 25 May 2014 and is tasked to coordinate a number of key developmental programmes and interventions involving a broad range of Ministries and public entities.



**Nkosi Johnson Memorial Lecture:** Nkosi Johnson's enduring legacy

South Africa's famous child AIDS activist, Nkosi Johnson, was born with HIV and died at the age of 12 in June 2001. At the time of his death, he was the longest-surviving child born with HIV in the country. His mother, Nonhlanhla Daphne Nkosi, who passed away in 1997, was HIV-positive and passed the virus on to her unborn child.

Nkosi rose to international prominence in July 2000 when he delivered his self-written address, televised worldwide, to 10 000 delegates at the 13th international AIDS conference in Durban. A tiny figure in a shiny dark suit and sneakers, 11-year-old Nkosi Johnson held an audience of 10 000 delegates in occasionally tearful silence as he told his story. "Care for us and accept us- we are all human beings", he said at the conclusion of his speech. "We are normal. We have hands. We have feet. We can walk, we can talk, we have needs just like everyone else. Don't be afraid of us- we are all the same."

Nkosi and Daphne were admitted to an AIDS care centre in Johannesburg as the disease began to take its toll on Daphne. It was there that Gail Johnson, a volunteer worker, first saw the baby boy and his ailing mother. "It was very personal and mutual understanding, Gail said. "I had a graphic encounter with an AIDS death close to my family, and I wanted to do something more than just talk about it. And there was Nkosi. All I had to do was reach out for him." Daphne readily agreed to Gail becoming Nkosi's foster mother.

Nkosi was posthumously awarded the first KidsRights Foundation's international Children's Peace Prize in Rome in November 2001 for his effort in support of the rights of children with HIV/AIDS, and his legacy continues to live on through Nkosi's Haven, which houses and supports HIV-positive mothers and children.

Sex workers (SWs) in South Africa have a disproportionately high risk for HIV acquisition and onward transmission. The South African Health Monitoring Survey of Female Sex Workers estimated the prevalence of HIV among female SWs at 71.8 percent in Johannesburg, 39.7 percent in Cape Town, and 53.5 percent in Durban. The substantially high prevalence of HIV infection coupled with the possibility of onward transmission to their clients and partners, necessitated the National Department of Health to prioritize the roll out of pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) to SWs to avert new infections. PrEP is an additional prevention method for people who do not have HIV but who are at high risk of getting it. To prevent HIV infection, those eligible, take a pill each day. Eleven sites across the country are involved in this initial phase and more will be added. For this process to be effective, SW communities need to be adequately prepared and effectively engaged.

PEPFAR, the South African Government, Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, Girl Effect and other partners are working together to decrease the incidence of HIV in adolescent girls and young women in South Africa through a program called DREAMS (determined, resilient, empowered, AIDS-free, mentored and safe). There are many organizations and governmental agencies providing services and interventions throughout South Africa. However, the integrated approach of DREAMS envisions a comprehensive package of services that has the girl at the center, where she has access to all of the core interventions and services she may need - from the medical side of testing and treating to the psycho-social aspects of counseling and support to the resources required to aid in remaining in school.

In order to understand where implementing partners were operating within the defined priority areas subdistricts/municipalities/wards were identified in collaboration with government agencies, CBO's and other partners. Then USAID, CDC, and SANAC held a series of meetings with government departments, community and service providers to map where specifically they were doing their work, providing services and interventions down to the ward level. From there a clearer picture began to emerge illustrating if the layering of services approach was indeed happening or if there were gaps in the services within wards that meant not all services were available (no complete layering of services being achieved). This mapping process then served as a programmatic guide as to where partners should be working in order to provide the layering of the comprehensive package of services outline in the DREAMS program.

**Prof Deenan Pillay:** Deenan Pillay is an academic clinical virologist with a research and clinical interest in HIV transmission, antiviral therapy and drug resistance. In 2013, he was appointed as Director of the Africa Centre for Population Health, seconded from University College London. He is the Director of the Unified Africa Centre and K RITH Institute, Africa Health Research Institute. This is the first such joint Wellcome Trust and HHMI funded venture. He was previously Head of the Division of Infection and Immunity at University College London (UCL). He is a leader in the field of HIV drug resistance, particularly regarding risks of resistance emergence and subsequent transmission. His research work focuses on HIV virus evolution, and the impact of genomic variation on the biology of the virus. His work spans national, and internationally wide approaches to understand HIV transmission. Deenan led the virology work in the pivotal MRC-funded DART trial of antiretroviral therapy in Africa to estimate the impact of drug resistance on the efficacy of treatment rollout in endemic areas, feeding into WHO guidelines. He is PI on the BMGF Pangea HIV consortium which maps HIV transmission dynamics in the African generalised epidemics, through full length viral sequencing. He is also PI on the ANRS/BMGF Treatment as Prevention Trial, based at the Africa Centre for Population Health, which reports final results at the World AIDS Conference, Durban in 2016. In addition to being awarded > £30M from the Wellcome Trust to establish the AC/K RITH Unified Institute, Deenan has previously been PII on a £100M for the UCL Biomedical Research Centre. He is a Senior Investigator of the UK National Institute for Health Research (NIHR).



**Prof Linda Gail Bekker:** Linda-Gail Bekker, MBChB, DTMH, DCH, FCP (SA), PhD, is Deputy Director of the Desmond Tutu HIV Centre at the Institute of Infectious Disease and Molecular Medicine, UCT and Chief Operating Officer of the Desmond Tutu HIV Foundation. She is a physician scientist and infectious disease specialist. Her research interests include programmatic and action research around antiretroviral roll out and TB integration, prevention of HIV in women, youth and men who have sex with men. She is PI of the NIH (USA) funded UCTCTU and remains actively involved in the work of the 4 associated clinical research sites and 4 DAIDS networks. In particular she has chaired protocols for the HVTN and HPTN and has been IoR in a number of network related protocols. She has served on numerous international and federal scientific and working committees. She heads up the Desmond Tutu Centre of Adolescent Health and Wellbeing at UCT and the aim of this consortium is to develop best practices and evidence base around adolescent treatment and prevention of HIV, TB and STIs as well as the integration of these services within a robust adolescent friendly sexual and reproductive service platform. She has also now taken up her Presidency of the International AIDS Society and serves as the International Co-Chair of the 9th

IAS Conference on HIV Science in Paris in July 2017 and the International AIDS Conference in Amsterdam in 2018.



**Prof Penny Moore:** Penny Moore is Associate Professor and DST/NRF South African Research Chair of Virus-Host Dynamics at the University of the Witwatersrand and the National Institute for Communicable Diseases, and Research Associate at CAPRISA, University of KwaZulu-Natal. She obtained her MSc at WITS, studying gastroenteritis-associated adenoviruses. This was followed by a PhD at the University of London (studying the Hepatitis B virus) in 2003 before returning to South Africa. Her research focuses on HIV broadly neutralizing antibodies and their interplay with the evolving virus. Moore is funded through the South African MRC, the DST/NRF, the NIH and USAID.



**Dr Thumbi Ndung'u:** Thumbi Ndung'u is an Investigator and Max Planck Research Group Leader at the Africa Health Research Institute (AHRI). He is Professor and Victor Daitz Chair in HIV/TB Research and Director of the HIV Pathogenesis Programme (HPP) at the Nelson R. Mandela School of Medicine, University of KwaZulu-Natal. He holds the South African Research Chair in Systems Biology of HIV/AIDS. He is an Adjunct Professor of Immunology and Infectious Diseases at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health. He graduated with a Bachelor of Veterinary Medicine degree from the University of Nairobi, Kenya, and obtained a PhD in Biological Sciences in Public Health (Virology) from Harvard University, United States. He is on the advisory board of the Global Health and Vaccination Research Programme (GLOBVAC), The Research Council of Norway, and the Scientific Advisory Panel of the Poliomyelitis Research Foundation among other roles.

His research interests are host-pathogen interactions, particularly immune mechanisms of pathogen control. He has co-authored more than 150 papers in peer-reviewed journals. He has received grant funding from the South African Na-



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tional Research Foundation, the National Institutes of Health, the Howard Hughes Medical Institute and the Wellcome Trust among others. He is leading a multidisciplinary team of researchers working in the fields of HIV and TB pathogenesis and vaccine development. He has special interest in capacity building for biomedical research in Africa.

There is increasing acceptance that law enforcement agencies play an important role in creating an enabling environment for the delivery of HIV responses to key populations. In a recent multicentre survey at four South African hospitals, adverse drug reactions (ADRs) caused 8.4 % of admissions into medical wards<sup>1</sup>, and contributed to the death of up to 16 % of patients who died in medical wards<sup>2</sup>. About one-third of these serious ADRs were attributed to the use of antiretrovirals, antituberculosis agents, and/or co-trimoxazole<sup>1,2</sup>. In an analysis of queries to the National HIV & TB Health Care Worker Hotline, queries from health care workers regarding ADRs to antiretroviral and antituberculosis treatment made up a significant portion (8.8%) of all queries<sup>3</sup>.

The South African National Strategic Plan highlights the importance of prioritising both key and vulnerable populations in the efforts to end the AIDS epidemic. While key populations such as sex workers, LGBTI, injecting drug users are often considered as an important priority in the response to HIV and AIDS, vulnerable populations such as girls & young women, informal settlement dwellers, persons with disabilities or the elderly are often left behind, lacking access to public health care services while simultaneously being exposed to a number of HIV-risk factors. Young women, people living in informal settlements, and women with disabilities are for instance disproportionately affected by unintended pregnancies, unsafe abortions, sexual violence and sexually transmitted infections (STIs) all of which contributes to the high HIV-prevalence in these groups. In addition, in South Africa, the HIV-incidence among these groups is still alarmingly high ranging from 2/100 persons per year to 10/100 person-years depending on the geographical area and population sample. Social-economic, behavioural and structural factors further increase their risk of acquiring HIV.

Therefore, this proposed skills building workshop will aim to discuss current innovative strategies and outcomes of HIV-prevention research and interventions targeting vulnerable populations. A panel of HIV-prevention trial participants, implementers, representatives of vulnerable groups and researcher will discuss the current biomedical, social/behavioural, and structural innovations and their suitability, accessibility and acceptability for vulnerable populations.

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South Africa continues to make tremendous progress towards elimination of mother to child transmission (MTCT) of HIV. According to the national routine programme data (December 2016) MTCT rates are estimated to be 0.9% at birth and 1.4% at 10 weeks. Over 90% of HIV positive pregnant women in South Africa receive ART for their own health through the national program. The coverage of birth HIV PCR testing increased to over 86% nationally (December 2016), compared to 77% in 2015

The national plan for elimination of MTCT has identified critical game changers to enable the country to run the last mile marathon towards final goal of elimination and certification. Some of the critical game changers to close the gaps in eMTCT include safe pre-conception services especially for young mothers, improved postnatal follow up systems including viral load monitoring and aggressive management for high risk mothers, safe breastfeeding practices and vibrant community linkage and referral systems

**Dr Juan Garay:** Dr Juan Garay, a public health physician from Spain, worked in rural West Africa in the 80s and in rural Matabeleland (Zimbabwe) in the 90s, committing since then to global health equity and justice. He has worked with civil society movements (as with MSF introducing the first HIV treatments in many countries of sub-Saharan Africa), universities (he is professor of Global health in several universities in Europe and America), governments and international organizations. Since 2002 he works in the European Union where he coordinated the policy and work in global health and from 2013 he coordinates cooperation in social cohesion in Mexico and Latin America. His latest work focuses on health equity metrics and its power to transform societies enabling the universal right to health.



**Dr Paul Shuper:** Dr. Shuper's research examines alcohol's role in the ongoing HIV epidemic. His endeavours have included 1) meta-analyses and systematic reviews that established linkages between alcohol consumption and HIV prevention-related factors; 2) community-based research identifying HIV-related resilience among alcohol-using men-who-have-sex-with-men (MSM); and 3) the first risk-focused alcohol administration experiment involving PLWH, which provided empirical support for a causal association between alcohol consumption and HIV transmission risk behaviour. Based on his work, Dr. Shuper has served as a scientific expert in the area of alcohol and HIV for the WHO. He has been involved in HIV research in South Africa since 2007.



**Ms Anne Githuku-Shongwe:** Anne Githuku-Shongwe is the newly-appointed Representative for UN Women's South Africa Multi-Country Office (SAMCO), which is responsible for women's empowerment and gender equality in Botswana, Lesotho, Swaziland and Namibia as well as South Africa, where the office is based. Anne also brings to her role 20 years of experience as a senior international development professional including with the United Nations Development Programme across Africa and managing US Scholarships for African Graduate Scholars.

Anne has been an award-winning social entrepreneur and founder of Afroes, a Digital & Gamification Learning enterprise and a thought leader on the Future of Learning. Anne and Afroes received multiple awards including the prestigious Schwab Foundation/World Economic Forum Social Entrepreneur of the Year 2013 Award and a National Award – the Order of the Grand Warrior from the President of Kenya. Other awards include the PeaceAPP award of the UN, MEFFYS Award, London UK and Netexplo Award, Paris to name a few.

Anne is a Board Member and Grand Juror of the World Summit Awards for the UN Information Society, a Board Member of CHESTRAD International and I WILL GIVE – a new innovative domestic financing vehicle for African development.

She has a Masters' degree in International Development from The American University; a certificate in Social Innovation from the University of Cape Town, Graduate School of Business, a certificate in The Art of Large Scale Systems Change for Social Entrepreneurship from Harvard University and a Management Certificate from Jones International University.

**Prof Gita Ramjee:** Gita Ramjee PhD FRCPE, Chief Specialist Scientist and Director of the South African Medical Research Council's HIV Prevention Research Unit.

Dr Ramjee holds an Honorary Professorship from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, London, as well as Clinical Professorship at the University of Washington.

Dr Ramjee specializes in HIV prevention and treatment research with integrated care programmes among women and men in communities around the greater Durban area in South Africa. As the Clinical Trials Unit Principal Investigator, she has had oversight of an expansive portfolio of phase I through phase III HIV prevention and treatment clinical trials. She is a member of several local and international committees and advisory groups including the Academy of Science of South Africa (ASSAf) and the South African National AIDS Council (SANAC).



**Mr Zane Dangor:** Over the past 20 years Zane Dangor has worked through the Development Resource Centre and as a consultant and led strategic planning sessions, change management and evaluations of various public, private sector and non-profit organisations. This includes building the capacities of organisations leading to better leadership and management approaches and he is a local and international key note speaker.

While with the NUM he was engaged in supporting producer loops as a consultant he worked with Governments and CSOs in South Africa, the SADC Region and East Africa on key issues of Human and Social Development, especially in advancing Gender Equality. He was part of the team comprising of Stats SA and Department of Social Development that engaged in public dialogues with Civil Society organisations on South Africa report on the MDGs. As a CSO activist and later as a consultant he has been involved in facilitating dialogues towards peace and development, including working towards improving closer working relationships between the then newly established Palestinian Authority and Palestinian NGOs and encouraging NGOs advocating for democracy in Abacha's Nigeria to work together. In 1996 he played a role in efforts to build a closer working relationship between Palestine NGO's and the then newly established Palestinian authority. Zane Dangor helped found the SA National NGO Coalition and while in the DRC established a learning network between SA and Philippines NGO's.

He managed the Development Resources Centre's input towards the South African Human Development Report. Co-development of the UN Common Country Assessment for South Africa. He was appointed as the Advisor to the Honourable Minister of Social Development, Mrs BO Dlamini from April 2010 to October 2016. Currently he serves as the Director-General of the department of Social Development. There are a number of select publications and papers published by Zane on the NGO sector and on poverty.



**Dr Paul Semugoma:** I am a medical doctor, trained in Tanzania and Uganda. A clinical encounter at practice made me appreciate the lack of information and programming for gay men in Uganda and Africa as a whole about HIV, and the stigma informed ignorance of health practitioners on the need and importance of such programming.

Working with the local kuchu (queer) community, we organised around HIV, both openly and clandestinely, campaigning for recognition of the problem, and appreciation of the need to act. In 2009, the Anti-Homosexuality Bill was introduced in the parliament of Uganda. Despite being wildly popular in the country, we projected severe consequences with regards to programming for MSM. We campaigned with local and international partners, leading to removal of the more horrendous provisions of the bill (Death penalty) and delay in its passage. I delivered an assessment of the effects of the bill as law on HIV prevention to the Parliamentary Legal Affairs Committee.

During the International Aids Association AIDS (July) 2012 Meeting in Washington DC, I was honoured to give a well-received plenary speech on 'Turning the Tide for MSM and HIV' publically acknowledging that I am a gay human being and a gay African.

I relocated to South Africa afterwards, partly because of possible repercussions to my coming out. Getting legal residence to stay in South Africa was difficult, culminating in detention at O.R. Tambo International Airport, for immediate deportation back to Uganda in February 2014. Fierce activism both locally and internationally allowed me the legal right to stay and work in South Africa.

The Anti-Homosexuality Bill in Uganda was passed by parliament in Dec 2013 and was signed into law by the President in March 2014. We launched a constitutional court challenge where I was one of the Respondents, again emphasizing the public health effects of the legislation. The law was annulled on technical grounds in August 2014.

At the International AIDS Association Conference in Melbourne, Australia 2014, I was honoured to be the 3rd Recipient of the Elizabeth Taylor Award for HIV and Human Rights.

I have been involved in various organisational efforts locally and internationally to promote the visibility of the MSM and transgender people in HIV programming. I was a Steering Committee member of the Global Forum for HIV and MSM (MSMGF) (2008-12), a founding board member of the African Men for Sexual Health and Rights (AMSHer), a pan African organisation promoting organisation and health care activism of MSM in Africa.

Currently, I live happily with my partner and our children in Cape Town, South Africa where I have been working with Anova Health, a national NGO on its Health4Men program which targets 'MSM' in research and health care delivery.

**Dr Connie Kganaka:** Dr Malega Constance Kganakga officially joined SANAC in 2014 as an Executive Manager for the National Strategic Plan (NSP) Unit. Prior to that, she worked with SANAC on a consultancy basis. She served as a member of the Technical Working Group to develop the country's National Strategic Plan since its inception. Dr Kganakga has worked as a Chief Director for HIV, AIDS & TB at the Department of Social Development where she led development policies, strategies and programmes in response to HIV and TB for the department. She participated in various UN Commissions relating to HIV response. She also worked for the Nelson Mandela Foundation as a Programme Manager for HIV. Dr Kganakga holds a PhD from Medunsa, two Masters Degrees; one in Public Health from Tulane School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine in New Orleans, USA, and another in Psychology from the University of Pretoria. She started her career as a nurse and, later became a lecturer in various institutions of higher learning. Her career in the academic field advanced to that of Acting Head of Nursing, an Associate Professor and Deputy Dean at Medunsa.



**Mr Anele Yawa:** Anele Yawa became a TAC member in 2002. From 2003 to 2005 he was a TAC district organizer in the Nelson Mandela Metro Municipality (Port Elizabeth). In 2008, he was elected as the Deputy Chairperson of TAC in the Eastern Cape. From 2010 to 2013 he served as TAC's Eastern Cape Provincial Chairperson and also as a member of the National Council of TAC. In July 2013 Anele became TAC's National Chairperson. Following the resignation of former TAC General Secretary Vuyiseka Dubula in February 2014, he stepped in to lead the organization in the transition period. As of July 1st 2014, Anele Yawa is officially the General Secretary of the TAC.

**Dr Fareed Abdullah:** Fareed Abdullah is a medical doctor and a specialist in public health medicine. He was Deputy Director General and head of the AIDS Programme in the Western Cape government from 1994 to 2006 where he led the implementation of the first public sector PMTCT and ART programmes in South Africa. He has held senior management positions at the International HIV/AIDS Alliance (UK) and the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, TB and Malaria (Switzerland). From 2012 to 2017 he was the CEO of the South African National AIDS Council. He joined the SA Medical Research Council in June 2017 as the Director of the Office of AIDS and TB Research.



**Prof Glenda Gray:** Glenda Gray, MBBCH, FCPaed (SA), DSc (honoris causa), an NRF A rated scientist, is the President of the South African Medical Research Council. Gray, who trained as a Medical Doctor and Paediatrician at the University of the Witwatersrand, co-founded and led the Internationally renowned Perinatal HIV Research Unit, based at the Chris Hani Baragwanath Hospital in Soweto. She has expertise in mother to child transmission of HIV, HIV vaccines and microbicides. She is the Co-PI of the HIV Vaccine Trials Network and Director of the HVTN International Programs. In 2002, she was awarded the Nelson Mandela Health and Human Rights Award for pioneering work done in the field of Mother-to-Child Transmission of HIV-1. She is a member of the Academy of Science in South Africa, and chairs their standing committee on health. She is a member of the Institute of Medicine, of the National Academies, and serves on their Global Health Board. She has also been confirmed as the Chair for the Global Alliance for Chronic Diseases (GACD). Gray has also been awarded the IAPAC “Hero of Medicine” award for work done in the field of HIV treatment in children and adults. In 2009, James McIntyre and Gray received the N’Galy-Mann lectureship in recognition of their HIV research contribution in South Africa. In June 2012 she received a DSc (honoris causa) from the Simon Fraser University, Vancouver for her work in the field of mother to child transmission of HIV. She has also been admitted into the American Academy of Microbiology in 2012. In 2013 she received the country’s highest honour, the Order of Mapungubwe, granted by the president of SA for achievements in the international area which have served South Africa’s interest as well as the EDCTP’s outstanding Africa scientist award. In 2017, she was listed amongst the Times 100 influential people in the world.



**Mr Steven Smith:** Steven Smith is the Health Attaché to South Africa and United States Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Regional Representative for Southern Africa.

The major HHS Operating Divisions with activities in Southern Africa include the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the National Institutes of Health (NIH), and the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA).

Mr. Smith has extensive overseas experience from his work with the United States Department of State in Cameroon, South Africa and Haiti. In Cameroon Mr. Smith was responsible for HIV programs, and in South Africa Mr. Smith was Coordinator for the President’s Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief during its initial period of dramatic growth from 2004-2006.

From 2007-2010, Mr. Smith served as Director of the Office of Global Research at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, National Institutes of Health. The National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases supports and conducts biomedical and behavioral health research in over 100 countries worldwide, including significant programs in South Africa.

In 2010, Mr. Smith served as Haiti Health Reconstruction Coordinator, with overall responsibility for managing the United States Government response to the Haiti cholera outbreak.

From 2011-2013, Mr. Smith served as India Health Attaché and DHHS Regional Representative for South Asia, where he led the successful development of the U.S.-India Health Initiative supporting bi-lateral collaboration across a broad spectrum of health issues.

Mr. Smith has additional experience working for the United Nations, and as a human rights lawyer in South Africa. Mr. Smith received a J.D. degree from Columbia University in New York and a B.A. from Amherst College in Massachusetts.



**Mr Gana Fofang:** Gana Fofang is the United Nations Resident Coordinator and UNDP Resident Representative in South Africa. He has extensive experience in the politics and economics of development with several years of progressively responsible functions in the United Nations system. Prior to his appointment to South Africa, Mr. Fofang was Deputy Special Representative of the UN Secretary General and UN Resident Coordinator in Guinea Bissau and earlier was Senior Policy Adviser at UNDP RBA, New York, USA. Between 2000 and 2011, he was the UNDP Resident Representative and Deputy Representative in Sao Tome, Laos, Rwanda and Mozambique. He also held various positions within the private sector in project finance, UNDP and UNICEF (United Nations Children’s Fund) from 1988 to 1999, in the USA, Cape Verde and Algeria.

Mr. Fofang holds a Master of Philosophy in economics and development from the University of Cambridge, United Kingdom, and a Bachelor of Arts in politics from Princeton University, United States.

**Dr Aaron Motsoaledi:** Dr. P.A Motsoaledi was a student leader and a political activist of note, who spent most of his political life as a health activist mostly campaigning for access to quality health care including pharmaceutical resources for the poor especially in marginalised communities and rural areas. He worked with the entire South African Mass Democratic Movement and the Trade Union Movement in general, particularly in the (Kwa-Zulu) Natal region where he was based.

Dr. Aaron Motsoaledi elected to serve in the leadership of the United Democratic Front (UDF) in Natal where he led the student component to the launch of the UDF in Michells Plein in the Cape Flats, Cape Town in 1983.

#### Post-Schooling Political Activities

Dr. P.A Motsoaledi is a member and leader of the ruling African National Congress (ANC). He was the Member of Provincial Executive Council (PEC) of the ANC in Limpopo from 1990 to 2008 (18 years) and served as Deputy Chairperson for the Province twice. He was elected to the ANC National Executive Committee (NEC) in 2007 and re-elected at the 2012 Mangaung Elective Conference.
